The Scratch team had a busy autumn participating in both the finals of the Queen Elizabeth Coronation Trophy at Royal Burgess and The Grafton Morrish at Hunstanton and Brancaster. In Edinburgh, after an impressive defeat of Watsons in the first round the team lost narrowly to Stewarts Melville with all three matches going to extra holes.

It was the first time that we had reached the finals of the Grafton Morrish for some years and we narrowly lost a tough tie to Radley in the first round. However, this put us in the Plate Competition where thanks to James McCormick and James Guterman recording the highest stableford score, Loretto won the Solihull Salver. The weekend allowed the team to get to know the courses and they look forward to returning.

Meanwhile the team awaits the draw for the Centenary Halford Hewitt Tournament which will be made on 10th January. The tournament itself starts on Thursday 11th April.
